The purpose of this study is to understand, describe and interpret the experiences of reading and relating to fictional by adolescent readers. Specifically, the study explores the ways in which the reading engagement with these fictional characters informs the participants' choices for ethical action in their own lives. What is the nature of readers' identification and empathy experiences with fictional characters in literature? In what ways do adolescent students perceive they are able to project these experiences to their intentions for living ethically?

Teachers ask students to read and respond to literature and fictional characters in order to make connections with their personal understanding. We also ask our students to treat each other well, behave ethically and become responsible citizens. Literature(Levi-Strauss, Bruner, Coles) suggests that humans come to understanding of others through learning their stories. It is important to explore the connections which students actually make between fictional worlds of literature and lived worlds of experiences with others. What is the nature of students' perceptions of understanding through reading and fictional characters which can inform their actual choices for ethical behaviour in their lives? This study will offer teachers of literature an opportunity to understand some experiences of students who may make these connections between fiction and ethical decisions.
