Course Objective:

This course continues the introduction to the Latin language begun in Latin 101. It does so through a programme of daily reading and intensive study of vocabulary and grammar. The required texts for this course are listed above. Each class will normally consist of translation work and exercises, or instruction and practice of grammatical principles and vocabulary. **Please bring both Wheelock texts to class.**

Course Requirements and Evaluation Procedures:

Your final grade has four components, weighted as follows:

Vocabulary & grammar quizzes	20%
Tests (4 @ 10% each)	40%
Final exam	<u>40%</u>
Total	100%

There will be regular exercises and short quizzes. From time to time you'll also be assigned translation exercises from *Latin Stories*. The four tests are designed to test your grasp of the vocabulary and grammar concepts we study. You'll also sit a three hour final exam during the April examination period.

Make sure that you have also registered for the tutorial session for this course, it is compulsory and will be very helpful.

Regular class attendance is required for all courses, but is especially important in this course, as it is very much an exercise in incremental learning. There is a lot of material to cover during the term, and your success will depend largely on your ability to keep up (i.e. to do homework and to memorise, *memorise*, MEMORISE the vocabulary and grammatical forms).

If at any point you find yourself hopelessly confused or perplexed by something we've covered in class, please come and see me immediately. Such states are not conducive to learning Latin and should be cleared up as soon as possible. Feel free to bring up minor points of confusion in class as well. If you're baffled by something, there's a good chance that others are too—so don't be shy.
