Sarah Hunt is Co-Principal Investigator with the LE,NONET Research Project at the University of Victoria, an initiative to investigate best practices for supporting the success of Aboriginal post-secondary students. She has also worked for ten years as a community-based researcher on issues of intergenerational violence and youth sexual exploitation in communities across BC, with a particular focus on rural Aboriginal communities. Sarah is a member of the Kwakwaka'wakw First Nation.

Natalie Clark is on faculty in the School of Social Work and Human Service at Thompson Rivers University (TRU) in Kamloops, and is the Director of the Centre for Community-Based Youth Health Research at TRU. Natalie has worked as a community-based researcher, counsellor, girls' group facilitator, auntie and adult ally to youth in diverse communities across BC. Her current work focuses on issues of health in the lives of rural Aboriginal girls.

Helga Thorson is an Associate Professor in the Department of Germanic and Slavic Studies at UVic. Her teaching and research interests include Holocaust and Memory Studies, late nineteenth- and early twentieth-century German and Austrian literature and cultural studies, film studies, foreign language teaching pedagogy, and the history of medicine.

Tamara Tobler is a graduate student in the Department of Germanic and Slavic Studies. She is currently researching for her thesis, examining various symbolic representations of National Socialism as they appear in popular culture (film, television), as well as their influence on post-WWII society.
