Biography

Dr. Bodden took his PhD in Comparative Literature at the University of Wisconsin. He has published articles on: nationalism and gender issues in Indonesian literature and Indonesian and Philippine Theatre; grassroots and workers' theatre in Indonesia; postmodernism in recent Indonesian culture; censorship in late New Order Indonesian theatre; and is currently working on an article about the cultural politics of rap music in Indonesia and a book-length manuscript on theatre and politics in 1990s Indonesia. Dr. Bodden has also translated and published the work of several Indonesian writers-poetry by Saraswati Sunindyo, Nurhidayat Poso, and Afrizal Malna; plays and short stories by Putu Wijaya; and short stories, plays, and essays by Seno Gumira Ajidarma. He is generally interested in the connections between politics and culture, and in the ways in which culture resists oppressive social conditions, or at least, does the important utopian work of imagining how things might be different.
