One of the most original thinkers in the humanities today, Eric Gans argues that those categories deemed fundamental to humanistic inquiry must be traceable to their appearance in the originary scene of human culture. Gans calls this procedure "Generative Anthropology" and has written eight books and dozens of articles on the topic. In this lecture, Gans will speak about Jacques Derrida's idea of deferral and its relationship to Generative Anthropology's conception of a human science.
